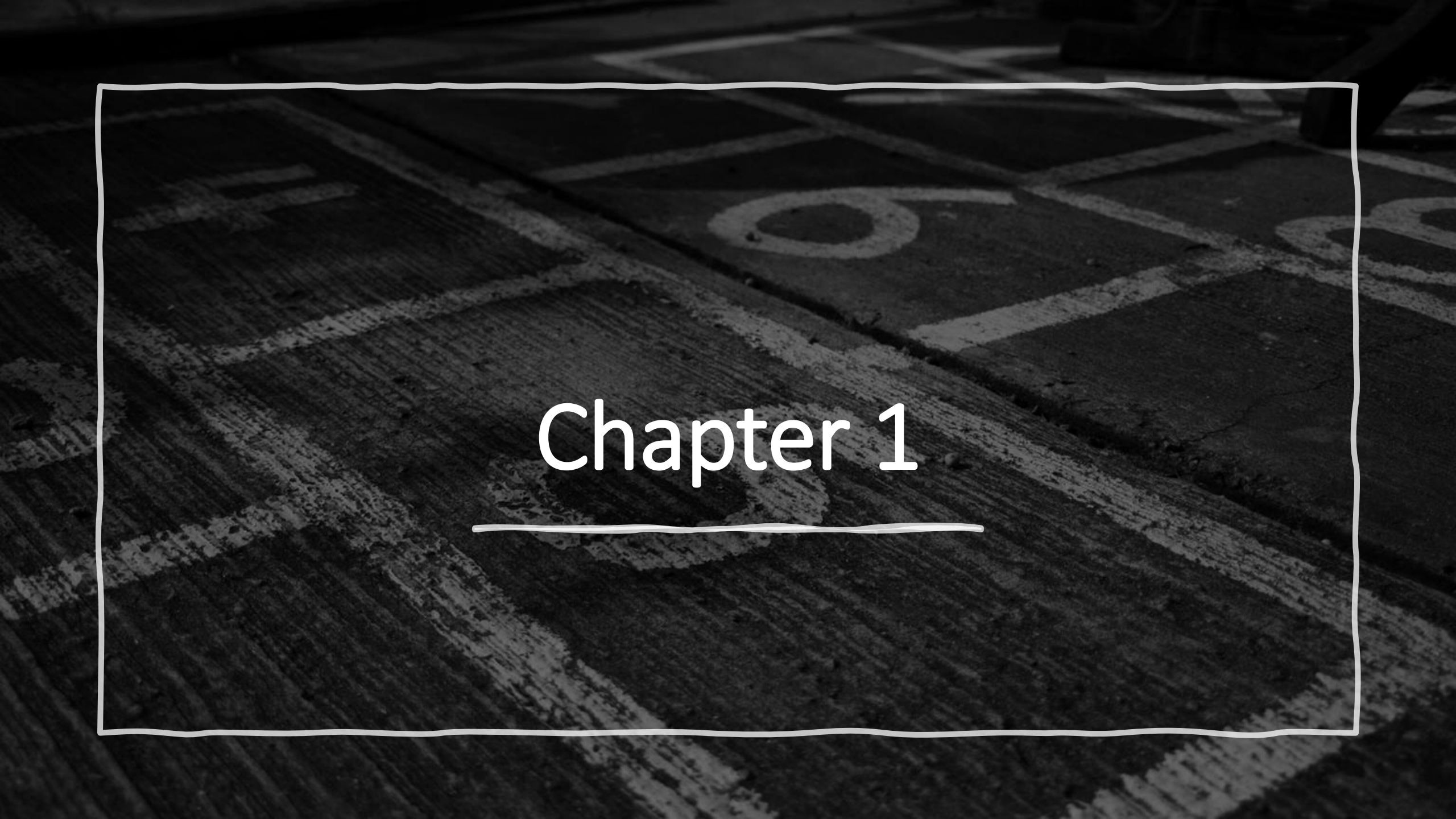

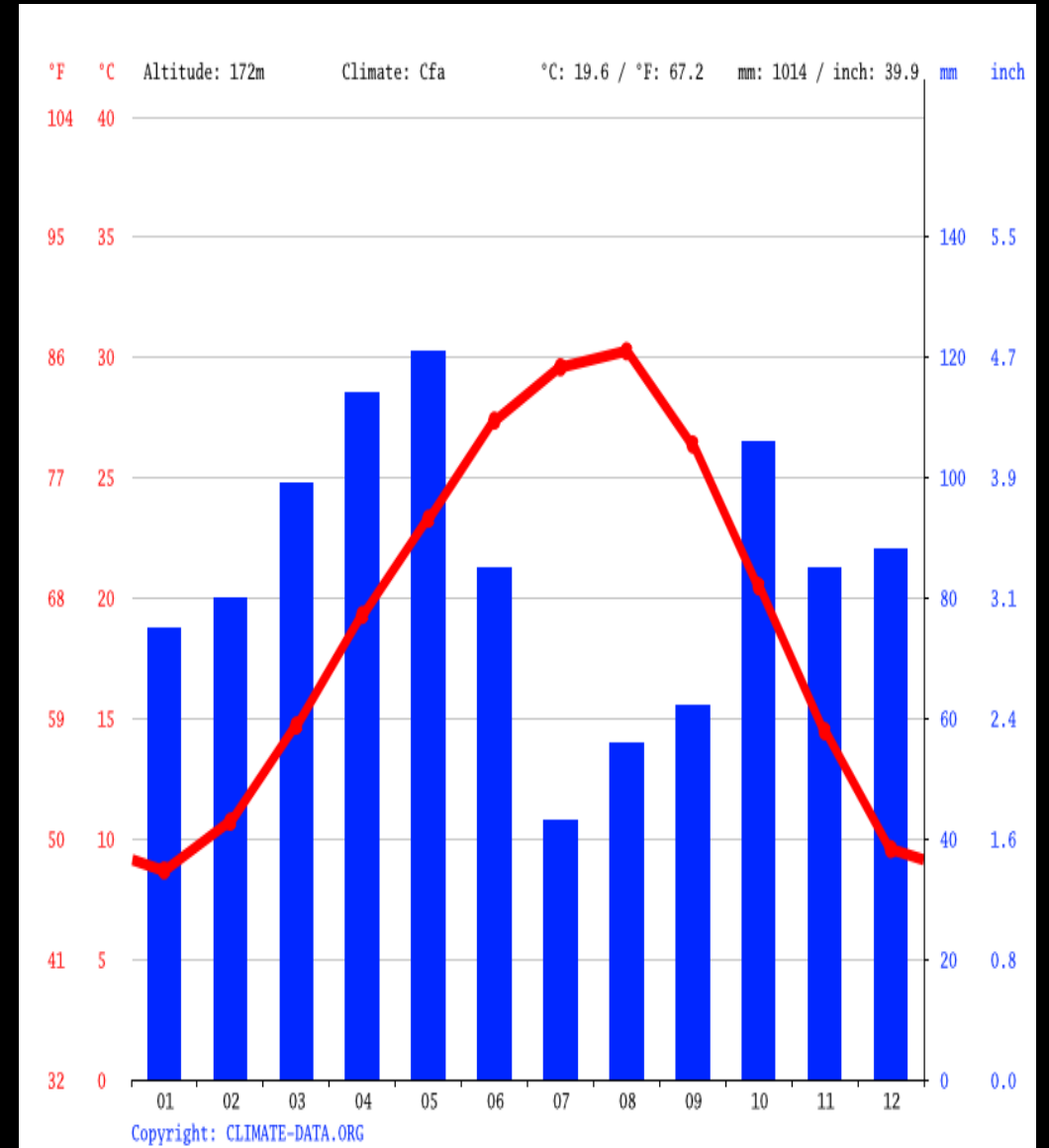
Animals adapted to the Mediterranean desert

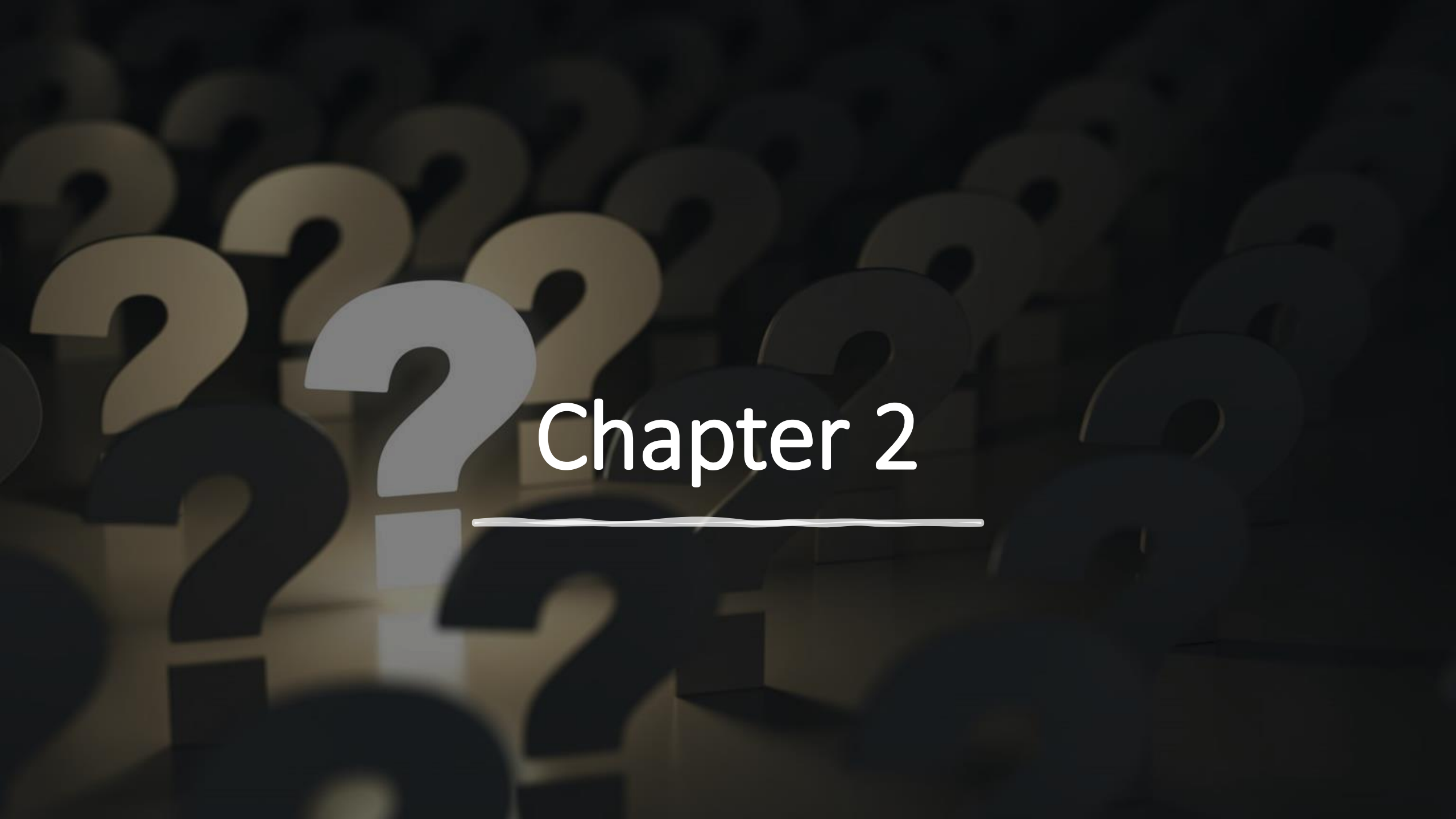

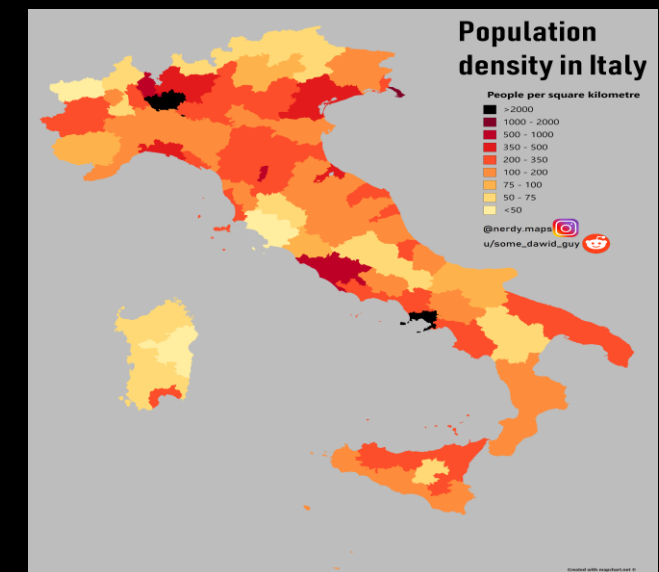
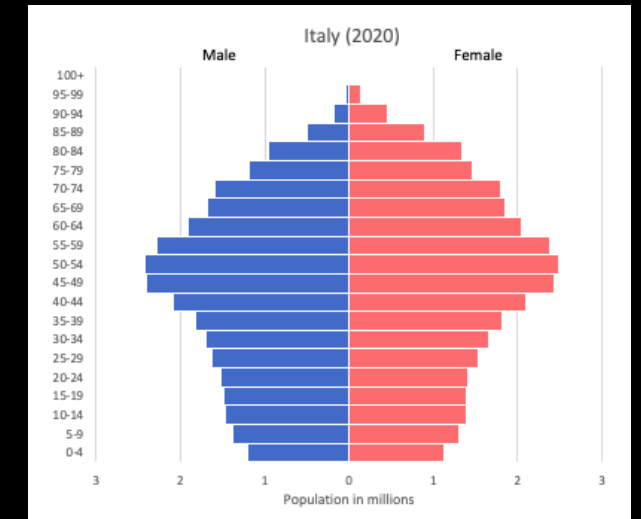


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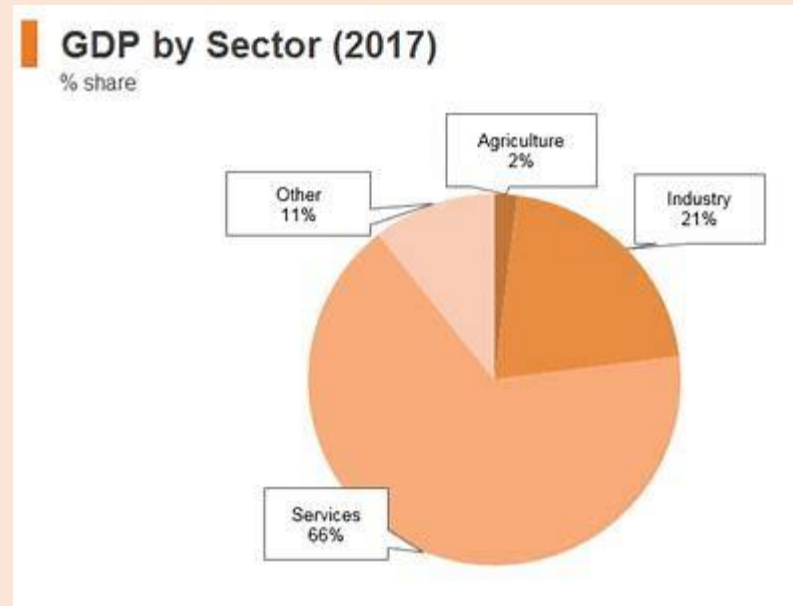
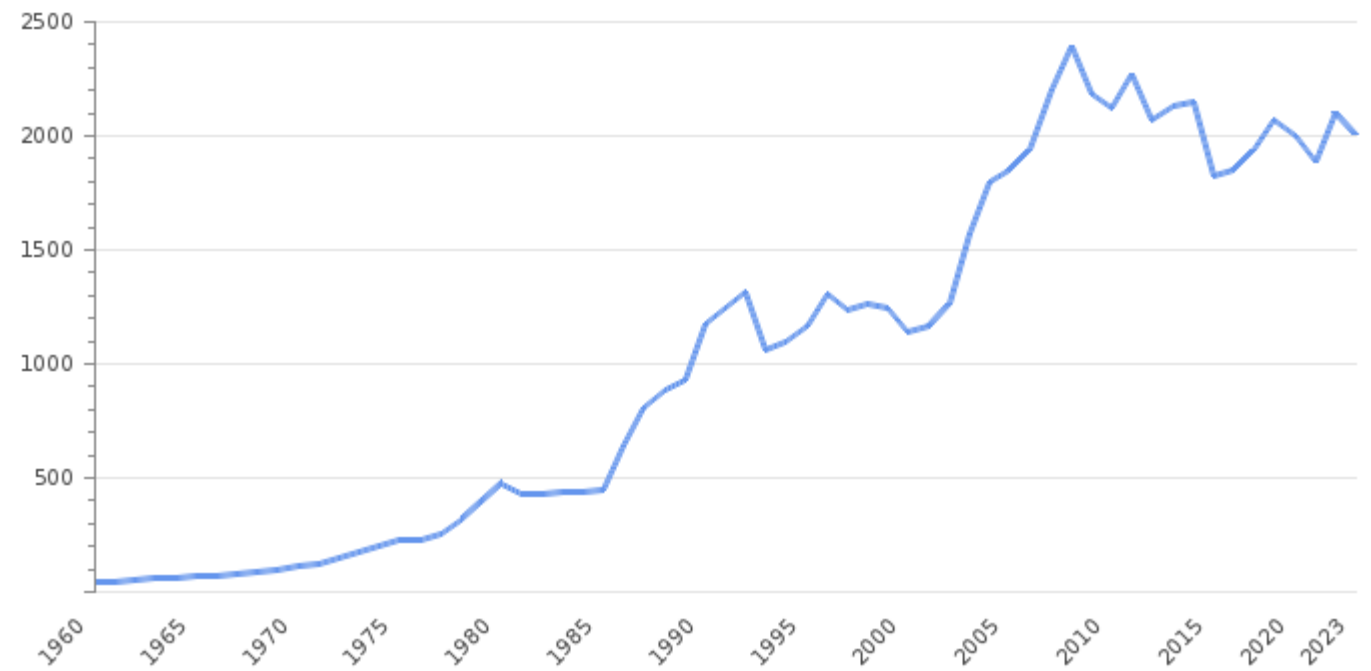
Chapter 2

- This graph is from 2020, showing an aging population in Italy, with a significant portion of the population being older than 50. This indicates a low birthrate, which can pose challenges for the economy. With many elderly individuals, there will likely be increased pressure on the government for pensions, and a shrinking working-age population may lead to slower economic growth.
- The population density map shows that Italy has a higher concentration of people in urban areas, particularly around cities like Milan, Rome, and Naples, where the density exceeds 1000 people per square kilometer. In contrast, rural areas in the southern regions and along the islands have much lower population densities, reflecting Italy's urbanization trend and the uneven distribution of its population.



The economy of Italy



- Italy's economy is a mix of manufacturing, fashion, tourism, and agriculture. Key industries include the production of luxury goods such as cars (Ferrari, Lamborghini), fashion (Gucci, Prada), and food products (wine, olive oil). 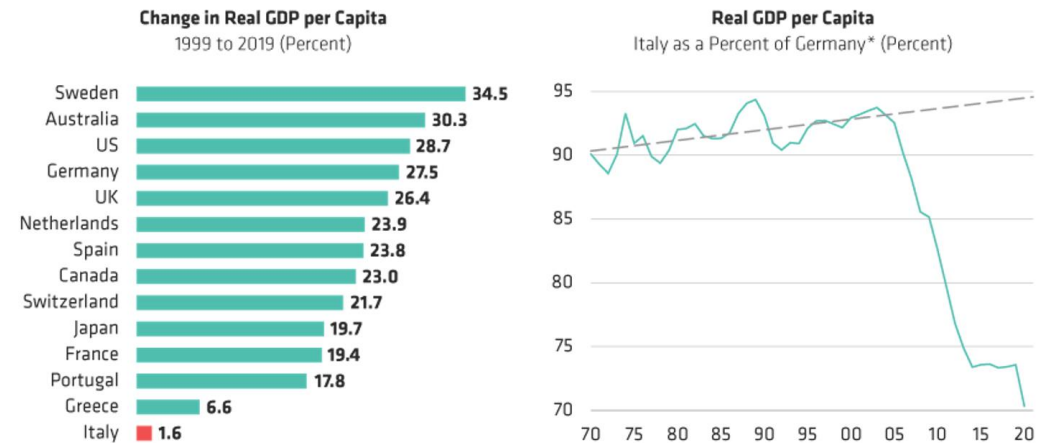


Economic Challenges

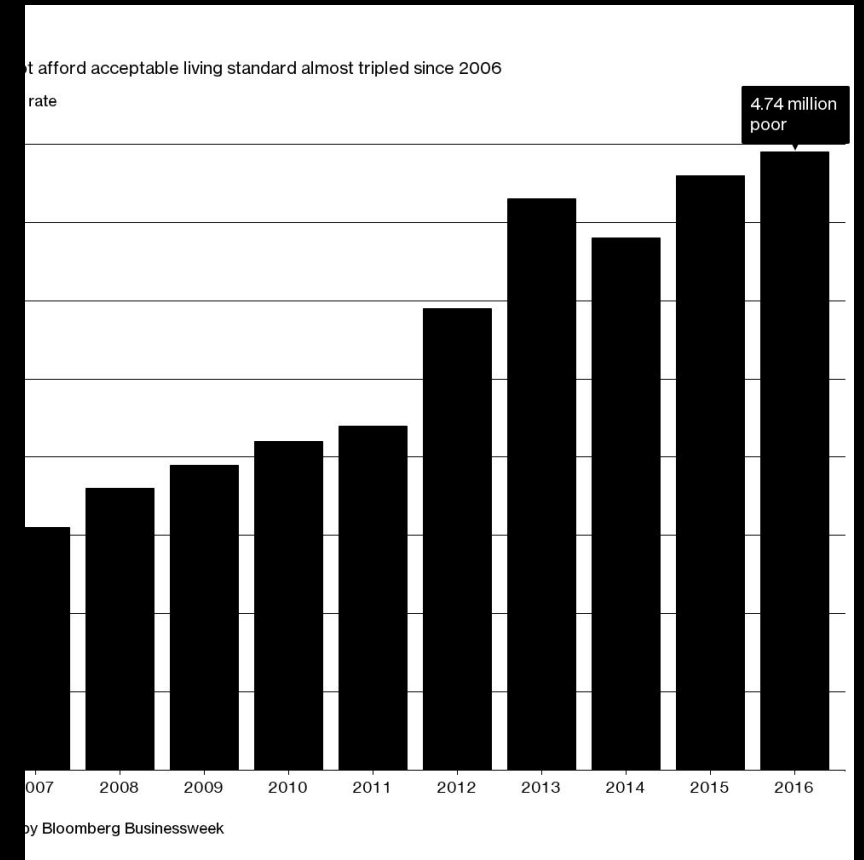
